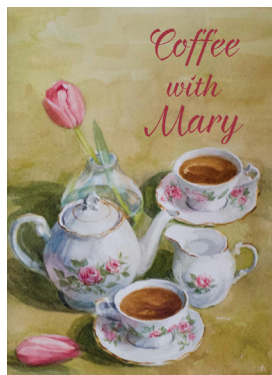

## Cinnamon Sugar Knot Rolls

A great menu treat that is super easy to incorporate into your day and a "knot" your whole family will love for sure.

### Ingredients

- pizza dough (or feel free if you have the time to make your own dough)
- 2 tablespoons butter melted
- 2 tablespoons cinnamon
- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar

### Dipping Sauce

- 2 cups confectioner's sugar
- 1-2 tablespoons heavy cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

### Instructions:

Preheat oven to 425° F. Cut pizza dough into strips that are about 6 inches long and 1 1/2 inches wide. Tie each strip into a knot. Brush with melted butter and sprinkled with cinnamon and granulated sugar. Place in oven and bake for about 10-12 minutes, or until golden brown. Remove from oven and serve with optional dipping sauce.

### Dipping Sauce Recipe:

Whisk together confectioner's sugar, heavy cream and vanilla in a medium bowl until creamy. Pour into a bowl for dipping.



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
